THE EPISTLE READING

The reading is from St. Paul's Letter to the Galatians
1:11-19

Brethren, I would have you know that the gospel which was preached by me is not man's gospel. For I did not receive it from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through a revelation of Jesus Christ. For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the church of God violently and tried to destroy it; and I advanced in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people, so extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers. But when he who had set me apart before I was born, and had called me through his grace, was pleased to reveal his Son to me, in order that I might preach him among the Gentiles, I did not confer with flesh and blood, nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were apostles before me, but I went away into Arabia; and again I returned to Damascus. Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to visit Cephas, and remained with him fifteen days. But I saw none of the other apostles except James the Lord's brother.

THE GOSPEL READING

The Holy Gospel is According to Matthew 2:13-23

When the wise men departed, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Rise, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there till I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." And he rose and took the child and his mother by night, and departed to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, "Out of Egypt have I called my son." Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, was in a furious rage, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time which he had ascertained from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah: "A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they were no more." But when Herod died, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt, saying, "Rise, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who sought the child's life are dead." And he rose and took the child and his mother and went to the land of Israel. But when he heard that Archelaos reigned over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he withdrew to the district of Galilee. And he went and dwelt in a city called Nazareth, that what was spoken by the prophets might be fulfilled, "He shall be called a Nazarene."

My beloved parishioners:

In few days we will be celebrating the kick-off of our Cathedral's 100th Anniversary year. On September 9, 1822, the cornerstone was laid for an Episcopal Church in Philadelphia which led America's fundraising support for the Greek War of Independence from the Ottomans. Exactly a hundred years later, this extraordinary Greek revival monument was bought by an emerging Greek community and became in 1922 the Saint George Greek Orthodox Cathedral in Philadelphia.

Since then we went through various liturgical seasons, our Christian and philanthropic ministries established and increased, our young students of the Catechetical and Greek Schools entered and graduated by the hundreds, buildings expanded, and district and national spiritual reputation uplifted; but beneath all of this spiritual evolution there is the living and changeless blessing upon all that transpires the Cathedral, blessed as all of us are by the smile of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and our patron saint, St. George the Trophy-Bearer.

The Cathedral community gives as best as it can and receives far more than it deserves of your own true loyalty, boundless generosity, and constant dedication. And as we are strengthened by your strength, I do hope that a very real blessing goes out from this place into all of our lives, to gladden our homes, to warm our hearts, to uphold our values, and to bring to us all, especially at Christmas time, the peace and blessing of the Christ child held in the arms of his dear mother, our Theotokos.

Christmas began with a family, and without that family there never would have been a Cathedral to love and cherish as a divine institution. And even in our present struggles because of the COVID pandemic, remember that we are not alone and that there is a God who journeys this life with us in our tragedies and sorrows. 


